# What Does the Bible Say about the Millenium (1,000 years)?

## Millenium Basics:

#### 1. **Definition**:


- a. A Millenium: It is a period of 1,000 years it can be a <u>literal</u> or a <u>symbolical</u> 1,000 years.
- b. Two basic Millennial beliefs: ⇒It's literal and yet to come; ⇒It's symbolic and now.
- c. <u>Timing and nature of the Millennium</u>: The exact timing and nature of what is meant by the Millennium is debated between three [or four] [interpretations of Scripture]:
  - i. **Premillennialism** [Dispensational Premillennialism and Historic Premillennialism are similar, here they are together, later we will see the differences between the two],
  - ii. Postmillennialism, and
  - iii. Amillennialism.1
- 2. <u>Terminology</u>: "Each term is distinguished by a prefix attached to the word "millennium," which is a compound of two Latin terms, mille [mee'-lay] (thousand), and annus (year). Over time, each view began to be known by its interpretation of Revelation 20:1-10, particularly the timing of the return of Christ with reference to the period of 1,000 years (Ibid.).
  - a. **Pre**millennialists believe Christ returns <u>before</u> the millennium ("pre" means "before").
  - b. **Post**millennialists believe Christ returns <u>after</u> the millennium ("post" means "after").
  - c. Amillennialists expect no millennium (The prefix "a" means, "no").

#### 3. **Summary**:

- a. The Millennium refers to the period of the 1,000-year reign of Christ mentioned in Revelation 20:1-6: That passage is [especially] difficult to interpret and has been the source of debate among the three <u>eschatological</u> [or four] schools of thought (Ibid.).
- b. What is eschatology? It comes from the Greek word, ἔσχατος (escatos), which means "last" or "final" things. So, eschatology is **the study of the last or final things**. "It is the study of Christ's future return, the resurrection, the rapture [which we will come to later in this study], the final judgment, the eternal blessedness of the redeemed with Christ, and the eternal punishment of the damned apart from his presence" (Ibid.).
- c. The three or four differences relate to the timing of the return of Christ regarding the 1,000 years and the precise nature of the Millennium.
  - i. <u>Premillennialists</u> believe Christ returns **before** the millennium preceded by a period of intense tribulation.
  - ii. <u>Postmillennialists</u> believe Christ returns **after** the millennium as a golden age when most of the world has converted to Christianity.
  - iii. <u>Amillennialists</u> do not expect a future literal 1,000 years but rather view it as Christ's reign with his saints during the time between his two comings (Ibid.).






