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## Mark 1:4-11 NIV

## Let's be certain about <u>Repentance</u>, <u>Baptism</u>, and <u>Jesus</u>!

**Introduction**: Dear friends in Christ: We recently celebrated Jesus' birth – *the toys are not yet broken and some clothes have not yet even been worn*, yet we now turn our attention to John's ministry which will lead us to Jesus' baptism and the beginning of His ministry! As we move through Mark 1:4-11, we will focus on the topics of <u>repentance</u>, <u>baptism</u>, and <u>Jesus</u>!

- 1. John's Ministry: <sup>4</sup> And so John came, baptizing in the <u>desert region</u> and preaching a <u>baptism of repentance</u> for the forgiveness of sins. <sup>5</sup> The whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem went out to him. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River.
  - a. <u>The location</u>: John could have gone to the people, yet God brought the people to him "in the desert region..." to pull them away from their daily routines and focus them on John's message of repentance. Think about the big differences between *\**living in a home versus a tent or *\**living with versus without electricity.
  - b. <u>Their repentance</u>: Repentance is ◆sorrow for sin and ◆faith in Jesus for the forgiveness of that sin. *God is the One who enables people to repent!* For children *we baptize first*; then teach them to live lives of repentance (*thus sorrow and faith*).

For adults *we call to repentance first*; then baptize them.

- i. God's work of repentance prepares a person to receive the forgiveness offered through baptism. Therefore, John refused to baptize the Pharisees who had no *evidence* of repentance (Mt. 3:7-10).
- ii. The Bible literally says that John was "preaching a baptism of repentance into a sending away of sins." Lenski wrote: "The sins are taken from the sinner and are sent away so far and in such a way that even God will not find them on the day of judgment" (31) NAS Psalm 103:12 "As far as the east is from the west, So far has He removed our transgressions from us."
- 2. John and Jesus: <sup>6</sup> John wore clothing made of camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. <sup>7</sup> And this was his message: "After me will come one more powerful than I, the thongs of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. <sup>8</sup> I baptize you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." //
  - a. John's connection to Elijah: People who had met Elijah gave this description of him: "He was a man with a garment of hair and with a leather belt around his waist." (2 Kings 1:8 NIV) The LORD said this through Malachi: "See, I will send you the prophet Elijah before that great and dreadful day of the LORD comes." (Mal. 4:5 NIV) Then Jesus helped us understand the connection

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when He said: John "is Elijah who is to come." (Mt. 11:14 ESV; see vv. 11-14)

- b. John's appearance and repentance: John's appearance was so rough and poor that his appearance itself "was a call [for change] to all who made food and drink, house and [clothing] their chief concern in life to turn from such vanity..." (Lenski, 38). We, and all of America, need that same message today!
- c. <u>The difference between their baptisms</u>: They were essentially the same, since they both included *the work of the Holy Spirit for the forgiveness of sins*! But this distinction can be made: John's baptism "made followers of the Christ to come... [Jesus' baptism made] followers of the Christ already come" (33).
- 3. Jesus' Baptism: <sup>9</sup> At that time [thus at the height of John's ministry] Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. <sup>10</sup> As Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. <sup>11</sup> And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased." // For more details, see Mt. 3:13-17.
  - a. Why was Jesus baptized? It was not to remove Jesus' sin He had none, neither was it to keep the law since baptism is gospel. Instead, in the words of Lenski, "Jesus was baptized by John because he regarded this as the right way in which to enter upon his great office" (43) as the Messiah, the Christ thus the One anointed by

the Holy Spirit to serve as the ultimate Prophet, Priest, and King! Also, we could say that Jesus voluntarily and publicly expressed His readiness to take away the sin of the world!

- b. <u>How was Jesus baptized</u>? Was He immersed or was water poured upon Him? We don't know, *but consider this statement by Lenski*: "All the ancient pictorial representations of the baptism of Jesus as well as of other baptisms—with not a single exception—show other modes, never immersion... Even the ruins of ancient baptisteries showed that these were too shallow to have made immersion possible" (46).
- c. <u>Key elements</u>: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit were present – audibly, bodily, and "like a dove." Jesus coming "out of the water" could be referring to *six inches* of water. The Spirit descended upon Jesus – not during but **after** His baptism. Even though Jesus remained humble, God the Father boldly declared Jesus to be His Son, the One He loves and with whom He is well pleased! *So Jesus should be very important to us!*

**Conclusion:** So let us \*continue in repentance—*thus in sorrow and faith,* \*rejoice that we have been baptized into Christ—*thus united to our Savior,* and \*ever-trust in Jesus *thus knowing that He alone is our ticket to heaven!* 

And all God's people said: Amen!

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
