Why Is God's Holiness a Problem for Us?

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: Are you okay? If you said, "yes," why are you okay? What makes you okay?

In 1969 Thomas Harris wrote the book, *I'm OK, You're OK*, which became one of the best-selling self-help books ever published. The book claims that "the phrase *I'm OK, You're OK* is one of four 'life positions' that each of us may take. The four positions are:¹

- 1. I'm Not OK, You're OK
- 2. I'm Not OK, You're Not OK
- 3. I'm OK, You're Not OK
- 4. I'm OK, You're OK

The first phrase is how you see yourself; the second phrase is how you see others. From a worldly perspective, *seeing yourself as okay is good*! Furthermore, if you think someone else is okay, *that is also good*! So if everyone in the world could honestly say, "I'm okay, you're okay," would everyone actually be okay?

Many would like to think so, *but God in His Word disagrees!* If God picked one of the four positions, He would pick number 3: *"I'm OK, You're Not OK."* God is okay because He is holy, but everyone in the world – *apart from Jesus* – is not okay because of sin. Let's move into Isaiah chapter 6:

- 1. God's Awesome Holiness: ¹ In the year that King Uzziah died [in 758 B.C.] I saw the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up; and the train of his robe filled the temple. ² Above him stood the seraphim. Each had six wings: with two he covered his face, and with two he covered his feet, and with two he flew. ³ And one called to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory!" ⁴ And the foundations of the thresholds shook at the voice of him who called, and the house was filled with smoke. //
 - a. Isaiah did not see the Lord face to face, but the Lord revealed Himself to Isaiah through an amazing vision. The vision included *the Lord's high throne, *the impressive train of his robe, and *the remarkable seraphim with their six wings.
 - b. The seraphim are amazing creatures, and yet even they cover their faces rather than look upon the Lord. They also called out: "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts..." St. Ambrose (340-397), an early church father, made this comment on their triple use of "holy": "They say it, not once, lest you should believe that there is but one; not twice, lest you should exclude the Spirit; they say not holies, lest you should imagine that there is plurality [thus more than one God], but they repeat three times and say the same word, that even in a hymn you may understand the distinction of

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Persons in the Trinity, and the oneness of the Godhead..." (*NPNF* 2 10:151).²

- Our Excessive Un-holiness: ⁵ And I said: "Woe is me! For I am lost; for I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips; for my eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts!" //
 - a. The Lord said to Moses, "you cannot see my face, for man shall not see me and live."
 (Exodus 33:20 ESV) Therefore, when Isaiah said, "Woe is me!" he was indicating that he was as good as dead! Those who heard Peter preach on the Day of Pentecost declared a similar reality; the Bible says that when they learned that Jesus, whom they had crucified, was both Lord and Christ "they were cut to the heart..."
 (Acts 2:37 ESV)
 - b. But why such a reaction? These words are from The Lutheran Study Bible: "God, the Holy One of Israel, is absolutely perfect, pure, and sinless. His absolute righteousness cannot tolerate the slightest error. He demands that we be perfect, as He is perfect (Mt 5:48; cf Lv 11:44). Yet, we are sinful, error-prone, and rebellious against our Maker. ³ He is holy, but we are not! He is okay, but we – apart from Jesus – are certainly not okay!

- 3. God's Awesome Action to Take Away Our Sin: ⁶ Then one of the seraphim flew to me, having in his hand a burning coal that he had taken with tongs from the altar. ⁷ And he touched my mouth and said: "Behold, this has touched your lips; your guilt is taken away, and your sin atoned for." //
 - a. The Lord blessed Isaiah by showing him the shocking contrast: *I am holy, but you are not!* Think about the greatness of Moses, yet, *when Moses approached the burning bush*, the Lord said to him, "Do not come near; take your sandals off your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." (Exodus 3:5 ESV)
 - b. Then the Lord took action to remove Isaiah's sin! The action was not earned or deserved; it was the Lord's gracious gift, it pointed to Jesus' ultimate work of atonement! Therefore, in Isaiah 6:8, when the Lord said, "who will go for us?" [Isaiah, filled with thanksgiving, was glad to say,] "Here am I! Send me." (ESV)
 - c. It is also important for us to see the contrast:
 God is so holy; we are so unholy! Then, being sorry for our sins, the Lord took radical action to make us holy in His sight through Jesus.

Conclusion: Today, God's Life-Changing Truth has focused on •God's holiness, •our un-holiness, and •Jesus' saving work. Now, *through Jesus*, let us know that we are holy in God's sight! And all God's people said: Amen!
