Are We Honoring Jesus as Lord – Part 2: Luke 4:1-13 ESV

When Jesus was Tempted, Did He Honor the Devil or God the Father?

Sunday, February 14 at 8:00 & 10:45 First Sunday in Lent – 2016

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: Last Wednesday we learned how **our Lord**—who is Jesus, was perfectly obedient to **the Lord**—God the Father. What were two wonderful results? God's perfect works of <u>creation</u> and <u>salvation</u>!

Then, in part 1, since Jesus wants our best, *He told us exactly how we should* *give to the needy, *pray, and *fast *in order to be blessed*!

Today we return to the relationship between **our Lord**— Jesus, and **the Lord**—God the Father. Since Adam and Eve were <u>tempted and fell</u>⁽²⁾, it was critical for Jesus to be <u>tempted and stand</u>⁽²⁾!

¹ And Jesus [right after His baptism, at the beginning of His ministry, and], <u>full of the Holy Spirit</u>, returned from the Jordan and <u>was led by the Spirit</u> in the wilderness ² for forty days, being tempted by the devil. And he ate <u>nothing</u> during those days [of temptation]. And when they were ended, he was hungry. // Since Jesus had a need for food, who would He honor, who would He listen to – the Devil or God the Father?

- 1. Prove It: Has someone ever dared you, double-dared you, or even triple-dog-dared you to do something? If you said, "yes," then that person was controlling you!
 - a. ³ The devil said to [Jesus], "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become [a loaf of] bread."
 - i. <u>Was Jesus hungry</u>? *Yes!* Could Jesus have turned a stone into a loaf of bread? *Yes,* Jesus is God the Son *through whom the Father created all things!*
 - ii. <u>Do you and I have abilities</u>? *Yes!* Can we ignore Jesus and be a Frank Sinatra (My Way)?¹ Yes!
 - b. ⁴ And Jesus answered him, "It [has been] written [in Deut. 8:3], 'Man shall not live by bread alone.'"
 - i. <u>The time of Moses</u>: The LORD caused the people to hunger; then He provided them with manna. He was teaching the people to *trust in Him to provide their needs!*
 - ii. <u>Jesus' answer</u>: He expressed His trust in His Father to provide His needs. What about us, in whom are we trusting – *ourselves or God*?
 - 1. Jesus said: "...seek first His kingdom and His righteousness; and all these things [thus all you need] shall be added to you" (Mt. 6:33 NAS).
 - 2. Paul wrote to the Philippians: "...my God shall supply all your needs" (Phil. 4:19 NAS).

When we trust in **our Lord Jesus**, \checkmark we have God's peace and \checkmark we desire to do whatever **He** says!

2. Take the Easy Way Out: Many have been lured down that path, so the devil hoped that Jesus would take the bait. If

He did, ☺the devil would win, ☺Jesus would lose, and ☺we would be lost forever!

- a. ⁵ And the devil took [Jesus] up and showed him all the kingdoms of the world in a moment of time [so the devil is very powerful], ⁶ and said to him, "To you I will give all this authority and their glory, for it has been delivered to me, and I give it to whom I will. ⁷ If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours."
 - <u>Did the devil have such authority</u>? Paul did call him "the god of this world [and Paul did write that he] has blinded the minds of the unbelievers" (2 Cor. 4:4 ESV). So he does have much power!
 - What else is the devil? Jesus told us: "...he is a liar and the father of lies" (John 8:44 ESV). Did he try to deceive Jesus? Yes! Will he try to deceive us? Yes!
- b. ⁸ And Jesus answered him, "It [has been] written [in Deut. 6:13; 10:12, 20; 1 Sam. 7:3], 'You shall worship the Lord your God, and him only shall you serve.'" // The devil is very clever, so his ideas can appear to be best; for example: (1) Read your Bible when it is convenient (but it never is); (2) forgive others when they deserve it (but they never do); (3) pay your bills first, then give to God from what is left (but that dishonors the Lord).
- Put God to the Test: There are times when we should not, but there are also times when we should!
 - a. ⁹ And [the devil] took [Jesus] to Jerusalem and set him on the pinnacle of the temple and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, ¹⁰ for it [has been] written [in Psalm 91:11-12], 'He will command his angels concerning you, to guard [protect] you,' ¹¹ and 'On their hands they will bear you up, lest

you strike your foot against a stone.''' // That kind of a
test is foolish!

- b. ¹² And Jesus answered him, "It [has been] said [Deut.
 6:16], 'You shall not test / tempt / over tempt the Lord your God.'"
 - i. When is testing wrong?
 - When we question the Lord's faithfulness: The Israelites said, "Is the LORD among us or not" (Ex. 17:7 ESV)? Every day He showed His presence!
 - When we make sinful demands: "They tested God...by demanding the food they craved" (Psalm 78:18 ESV). Instead, *let us humbly receive*.
 - ii. When is testing encouraged?
 - When we want to be sure of the God's will: Gideon said to God, "...let me make a test once more with the fleece" (Judges 6:39 NAS). Good!
 - 2. In our giving: Malachi wrote: "Bring the full tithe into the storehouse... put me to the test, says the LORD of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you a blessing" (Mal. 3:10 ESV). *I dare you!*

Conclusion: ¹³ And when the devil had ended every temptation, he departed from him until an opportune time. // So more attacks were coming for our Lord Jesus, even as they are coming for us. Therefore, let us ⇒take up God's Word of Truth and ⇒follow our Lord Jesus Christ! Let us pray... And all God's people said: *Amen!*
