What Was the Perspective of Pilate on Jesus?

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: Already, on this third Wednesday of Lent, the topic has taken us to the morning of Good Friday – both a <u>horrible</u> day and a <u>wonderful</u> day!

<u>We now focus on Pontius Pilate</u>: *who he was, *how he reacted to the Jewish leaders, *his questioning of Jesus, *his desire to release Jesus, and *his order to crucify Jesus.

- Pilate was the Governor of Judea: ^{ESV} Luke 3: ¹ In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, <u>Pontius</u> <u>Pilate being governor of Judea</u>, and Herod being tetrarch of Galilee... ² during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John the son of Zechariah in the wilderness. // Those were the key leaders when John was called to prepare the way for the Christ. The Bible is not filled with made-up stories, *but with true history!*
- Jesus is Delivered to Pilate: ^{ESV} John 18: ²⁸ Then [the Jewish leaders] led Jesus from the house of Caiaphas to the governor's headquarters. It was early [Friday] morning.... ²⁹ ... Pilate went outside to them and said, "What accusation do you bring against this man?" ...

- a. Luke 23: ² "We found this man misleading our nation and forbidding us to give tribute to Caesar, and saying that he himself is Christ, a king."
- b. John 18: ³⁰ "If this man were not doing evil, we would not have delivered him over to you."

John 18: ³¹ Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and judge him by your own law." The Jews said to him, "It is not lawful for us to put anyone to death." ³² This was to fulfill the word that Jesus had spoken to show by what kind of death he was going to die. // Earlier Jesus had said, "I, when I am <u>lifted up from the earth</u>, will draw all people to myself" (John 12:32 ESV), thus *pointing ahead to His crucifixion*!

3. Pilate Questioned Jesus: John 18: ³³ So Pilate entered his headquarters again and called Jesus and said to him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" ³⁴ Jesus answered, "Do you say this of your own accord, or did others say it to you about me?"³⁵ Pilate answered, "Am I a Jew? Your own nation and the chief priests have delivered you over to me. What have you done?" ³⁶ Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, my servants would have been fighting, that I might not be delivered over to the Jews. But my kingdom is not from the world." ³⁷ Then Pilate said to him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this purpose I was born and for this purpose I have come into the world--to bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth listens to my voice." ³⁸ Pilate said to him, "What is truth?" After he had said this, he went back outside to the Jews and told them, "I find no guilt in him." // Truth is important, it sets us free from the condemnation we all

deserve (John 8:31-32); then, *for those who have been set free*, they LISTEN to Jesus! <u>Are YOU listening</u>, thus **hearing**, **understanding**, **believing**, and **applying**?

- 4. More Accusations by the Jewish Leaders: ESV Luke 23: ⁵ "He stirs up the people, teaching <u>throughout all Judea</u>, from Galilee even to this place." ⁶ When Pilate heard this, he asked whether the man was a Galilean [because Pilate was looking for a way out of having to deal with Jesus]. ⁷ And when he learned that he belonged to Herod's jurisdiction, he sent him over to Herod... [Herod the Great is the person who tried to kill Jesus as an infant; this reference is to Herod Antipas, a son of Herod the Great and the one who had John the Baptist beheaded.]⁹ ... [Herod] questioned [Jesus] at some length, but he made no answer. ¹⁰ The chief priests and the scribes stood by, vehemently accusing him [yet even Herod would not take action]. ¹¹ And Herod with his soldiers treated [Jesus] with contempt [disrespect] and mocked him. Then, arraying him in splendid [bright] clothing, he sent him back to Pilate. // The Jewish leaders wanted Jesus dead, yet, so far, no one was willing to take action to crucify Jesus.
- 5. Pilate Wanted to Release Jesus: Luke 23: ¹³ Pilate then called together the chief priests and the rulers and the people, ¹⁴ and said to them, "You brought me this man as one who was misleading the people. And after examining him before you, behold, I did not find this man guilty of any of your charges against him. ¹⁵ Neither did Herod... Look, nothing deserving death has been done by him. ¹⁶ I will therefore punish and release him." [Scourge "The victim of a scourging was bound to a post..., stripped of his clothing, and beaten with the flagellum from the shoulders to the loins (the

flagellum was a whip-like instrument that was intended to tear the skin). The beating left the victim bloody and weak, in unimaginable pain, and near the point of death" <u>www.TruthMagazine.com</u>].

^{17 18} But they all cried out together, "Away with this man, and release to us Barabbas" ... ²⁰ Pilate addressed them once more, desiring to release Jesus, ²¹ but they kept shouting, "Crucify, crucify him!" ²² A third time he said to them, "Why, what evil has he done? I have found in him no guilt deserving death. I will therefore punish and release him." // Pilate did have Jesus scourged, hoping to *appease the crowd and *set Jesus free, but the crowd, spurred on by the Jewish leaders, would **not** back down.

6. Pilate Gave the Order to Crucify Jesus: Luke 23: ²³ [The people] were... demanding with loud cries that [Jesus] should be crucified. And their voices prevailed. ²⁴ So Pilate decided that their demand should be granted. ²⁵ He released the man who had been thrown into prison for insurrection and murder..., but he delivered Jesus over to their will. // Let's be honest, we are like that murderer – we deserve death, *but Jesus died for all of us*!

Conclusion: In the Apostles' Creed we confess that Jesus "suffered under Pontius Pilate..." Since Pilate ✓ was the governor, ✓ knew Jesus was innocent, and ✓ had the authority to release Him, he should have, but he did not. Do we know what is right? Yes! So let us *turn from our sins*; then, let us *rejoice in God's gift of forgiveness through Jesus*!

<u>Let us pray</u>: Dear Jesus, You endured everything for us; now, help us to grow in knowing You and living for You! Amen!
