Vocation – Part 3 of 4 "How Are You Being Called By God to Be a Citizen?"

 Based on Various Passages

 21st Sunday after Pentecost / 20th after Trinity

 October 4 & 5, 2008 ► Saturday at 5 • Sunday at 8:15 & 10:45

<u>Sermon Theme</u>: As we resume this four-part series on the topic of *vocation* or *calling*, let us *see* and *follow* God's plan for our Christian lives in the area of *citizenship*!

Introduction: Today we return to the topic of vocation, which refers to our God-given callings – those various ways in which God +puts us on as a mask and +works through us to provide for the needs of others! So far we have considered our callings as workers and family members; today we focus on our calling as citizens.¹

- 1. <u>Remember Your Dual Citizenship</u>: We have a reminder of that reality in our display of the U.S. flag and Christian flag right here in our chancel. But in our daily lives we tend to focus on what we see! As a way to remember your dual citizenship, I urge you to memorize these words written by St. Paul: "We do not look at the things that are seen but at the things that are not seen, for what we see lasts only a while, but what we do not see lasts forever." (NET 2 Corinthians 4:18)
 - a. <u>United States</u>: Most of us are citizens of the U.S. by birth, but some by application. *Either way, we are very blessed by our heavenly Father!* One person stated those blessings in this manner:

i. If you can attend church without fear of

harassment, arrest, torture, or death, you are more blessed than 3 billion people in the world.

- ii. If you have food in your refrigerator, clothes on your back, a roof over your head, money in the bank, and money in your wallet, you are among the top 8% of the worlds wealthy.²
- b. <u>Heaven</u>: In Christ through His perfect life, His substitutionary death, and the gift of faith by which we trust in Him alone we are citizens of heaven!
 - Peter reminded us of that reality when he addressed fellow believers as "aliens and strangers" – people who are present in one place, but rightly belong in another! (NAS 1 Peter 2:11)
 - Paul accurately stated our present situation with these words: "...our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Savior from there, the Lord Jesus Christ..." (NIV Philippians 3:20)
- Live Under the God-Established Governing Authorities: This section focuses on our responsibilities as U.S. citizens (next week we will focus on our responsibilities as members of God's kingdom and Bethlehem Lutheran Church).
 - a. <u>Government to Citizen</u>: Earlier this year, near the 4th of July, we focused on Romans 13:1-7, which clearly points to the almighty God as the one who +has established the governing authorities and +works through them to *commend those who do right* and *punish those who do wrong*. Furthermore, our government officials are supposed to be servants both *of God* and *of the people*!

- b. <u>Citizen to Government</u>: Since God has established the governing authorities and serves through them, we have an obligation *in almost every circumstance* to obey the governing authorities!
 - Peter wrote: "Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every authority instituted among men..." (NIV 1 Peter 2:13) Furthermore, as God's people, we are called to pray for ★our nation, ★our president, and ★all in authority! (2 Chronicles 7:14; 1 Timothy 2:1-2)
 - ii. Nevertheless, when commanded by the authorities "not to speak or teach at all in the name of Jesus. ... Peter and the other apostles replied: 'We must obey God rather than men!'" (NIV Acts 4:18; 5:29) Veith made this comment: "Sometimes a government might pass a law that violates the Law of God. Such a law can hardly claim divine authority." (111) Thus Christians are not obligated to obey it!
- <u>Citizen to Citizen</u>: God has placed us into + a nation,
 + a state, and + a community. As we live among our fellow citizens, God wants to *put us on like a mask* in order to bless them according to their needs. This passage is filled with instruction for *citizen to citizen*:

"Do not repay <u>anyone</u> evil for evil. Be careful to do what is right in the eyes of <u>everybody</u>. If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with <u>everyone</u>. **Do not take revenge**, my friends, but leave room for God's wrath, for it is written: 'It is mine to avenge; I will repay,' says the Lord. On the contrary: '**If your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink.** In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his head.' **Do not be** overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." (NIV Romans 12:17-21) By the Spirit let us daily live-out the Word as citizens!

3. Be a Citizen and a Ruler:

- a. Abraham Lincoln, *in his Gettysburg address*, expressed this noble desire "that government of the people, by the people, [and] for the people, shall not perish from the earth." That will continue *only* as each individual citizen exercises his right to vote, *thus to rule over our governing authorities*!
- In 2004, Christian voter turnout increased by 93% over 2002. As a result, four major abortion-restricting bills were enacted. However, in 2006, the Christian voter turnout decreased by 30%. In response, "The Baltimore Sun labeled the current Congress as 'the most pro-choice Congress in the history of the Republic."³ Please register and vote!

Conclusion: Veith wrote: "Christians who, like the prophets, challenge the evils in their societies...are acting in their divine vocation as citizens." (113) So, *forgiven in Christ*, let us live as citizens unto God's glory! And all God's people said: *Amen*!
