When All the World Was Cursed

Sunday, December 8 at 8:00 & 10:45 Second Sunday in Advent - 2013

Wednesday Services at 11 & 7; Meals at 12 & 6

Introduction: Dear friends, today, on this second Sunday in Advent, we turn our focus to John the Baptist – the one who was sent ahead of the Christ to prepare the people for His coming! People who lived 2,000 years ago were much like us today; they were sinners who needed the Savior!

Today, as we consider the words of this hymn: "When All the World Was Cursed," we will discover ◆why it was cursed and •how we were cursed. We will also discover how the Almighty God took drastic action to turn *the horrible curse* into a wonderful blessing!

- 1. Stanza 1:
 - a. When all the world was cursed, By Moses' condemnation, Saint John the Baptist came, With words of consolation. //
 - i. <u>Moses' condemnation</u>: ^{ESV} 2 Corinthians 3:7 "Now if the ministry of death, carved in letters on stone [the Ten Commandments], came with such glory that the Israelites could not gaze at Moses' face because of its glory...⁸ will not the ministry of the Spirit have even more glory?⁹ For if there was glory in the ministry of condemnation, the ministry of righteousness must far exceed it in glory." The LSB notes that "The old covenant ultimately exposed

sinners as those condemned to death [since no one could keep God's Law perfectly]. It gave way to the fulfillment of the Law and the promises of God by the ministry of Jesus Christ in the power of the Spirit."¹

- ii. John's consolation (comfort): These words are recorded in John chapter 1: "There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness, to bear witness about the light, that all might believe through him." (John 1:6 ESV) So how is that comforting? Through believing in Jesus, we receive God's gift of forgiveness!
- b. With true forerunner's zeal, The greater One he named, And Him, as yet unknown, As Savior he proclaimed. // John said these things about the coming Savior: "I baptize you with water, but he who is mightier than I is coming, the strap of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. (Luke 3:16 ESV) John also said about Jesus: "He must increase, but I must decrease." (John 3:30 ESV)

2. Stanza 2:

 a. Before he [John] yet was born, He leaped in joyful meeting, Confessing Him as Lord, Whose mother he was greeting. // Do you remember that occasion? Mary had just become pregnant with the Son of God; then she went to visit her relative Elizabeth who, in her old age, was

pregnant with John. The Bible says: "...when Elizabeth heard the greeting of Mary, the baby leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit, ⁴² and she exclaimed with a loud cry, 'Blessed are you among women [because you were chosen above all others to bear the Savior], and blessed is the fruit of your womb [the Savior of the whole world]! ⁴³ And why is this granted to me that the mother of my Lord should come to me? ⁴⁴ For behold, when the sound of your greeting came to my ears, the baby in my womb leaped for joy.'" (Luke 1:41 ESV)

b. By Jordan's rolling stream, A new Elijah bold, He testified of Him, Of whom the prophets told.

// We heard in today's gospel reading about
John's preaching of repentance and baptizing in
the Jordan River. John was different—clothes of
camel's hair and locusts for food; he also spoke
with much boldness! Later, Jesus said of John:
"...he is Elijah who is to come." (Matt. 11:14 ESV)

3. Stanza 3:

a. Behold the Lamb of God, That bears the world's transgression, Whose sacrifice removes, The devil's dread oppression. // Those words should cause us to recall the words spoken by John when he saw Jesus coming toward him: "Look, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" (John 1:29 NIV) Since all the people of the world have sin, the Son of God came as the Lamb of God to be the perfect sacrifice for everyone! Now, through Jesus' finished work and God's gift of faith, the devil no longer has power over us!

b. Behold the Lamb of God, Who takes away our sin, Who for our peace and joy, Will full atonement win. // Even though those words are set in a present and in a future tense, Jesus has already finished His work. Even now, through our God-given trust in Him, we have true peace and true joy – because, by God's grace, we know Jesus as our Savior!

4. Stanza 4:

- a. O grant, dear Lord of love, That we receive, rejoicing, The word proclaimed by John, Our true repentance voicing. // So how are we hearing the call to be sorry and believe? With •deaf ears, •indifference, or •gladness! Our old nature wants us to →close our ears to God's truth OR →change God's truth to fit our sinful lives; doing so might make us feel like winners for a while, but ultimately we will be losers! Therefore, God is calling us to †proper self-examination, †true sorrow for our sins, †saving faith in Jesus, and †Biblical fruits of faith!
- b. That gladly we may walk, Upon our Savior's way, Until we live with Him, In His eternal day.
 // So how is that possible? When we know the Bible is God's Word and is best for us; then we will gladly + know it, + live it, and + share it!

Conclusion: Since Jesus has removed the world's curse, *let us share that good news!* And all God's people said: **Amen!**

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
