Ruth, Chapters 1-2

Wednesday, 12/12 – 11 AM & 7 PM

Second Wednesday in Advent – 2018

During Advent: Wednesday Services at 11 & 7; Meals at 12 & 6

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: Today and next Wednesday, we will focus on the book of Ruth, which begins and ends in Bethlehem and covers about 12 years.

- <u>The book of Ruth</u>: It took place ¹ In the days when the judges were ruling... About 1380 to 1045 B.C. The book begins with a family, consisting of Elimelech, Naomi, and their two sons. They lived in Bethlehem; however, due to a famine, they went to stay in Moab, a neighboring country (Genesis 19:36-37).
- While in Moab: ³ ...Elimelech, Naomi's husband, died, and she was left alone with her two sons. ⁴ These married two women of Moab, one named Orpah, the other named Ruth. They lived there about 10 years. ⁵ Then [Naomi's two sons] died too, and Naomi was left alone, without her two sons and without her husband. Always, but especially when our circumstances are difficult, let us trust in the Lord!
- 3. <u>Returning to Bethlehem</u>: ⁶ ...while still in Moab [Naomi] heard the LORD had blessed His people and given them food. Therefore, she and her daughters-in-law started on the way back... So Bethlehem, the house of bread, had again been blessed with bread and they were returning!
- 4. <u>Naomi's unselfishness</u>: Even though her daughters-in-law could have helped her, she thought about them, so she said to them: ⁸ "Please go back, each of you to her mother's home. The LORD be kind to you as you were kind to the dead and to me. ⁹ The LORD help each of you find security in a home with

a husband!" As you think toward buying gifts, are you deciding what to buy based on what is best for those people?

- 5. <u>Naomi's encouragement</u>: Initially they both refused to return; then Naomi reasoned with them: ¹¹ "Why should you go with me? Do I have any more sons in my womb who could marry you? ¹² Go on back, my daughters, go! I'm too old to be a man's wife. Even if I did say, 'I still have hope,' even if I were a man's wife tonight and gave birth to sons, ¹³ would you then wait till they grew up and stay single for them?"
- 6. <u>Her daughters-in-law response</u>: Orpah decided to return to Moab, but Ruth said to her mother-in-law: ¹⁶ "Don't urge me to leave you, to go back and not be with you... I will go where you go and stay where you stay. Your people will be my people and your God my God. ¹⁷ I will die where you die, and there will I be buried. May the LORD punish me if anything but death separates you and me!" As Naomi tried to do what was best for Ruth by sending her back, so Ruth tried to do what was best for Naomi by staying with her.
- 7. <u>The two went to Bethlehem</u>: It was small in Jesus' time (maybe 300), smaller – around 700 BC – when Micah wrote these words, "you, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, are too little to be among the clans of Judah... (Micah 5:2 ESV), and smaller yet – hundreds of years earlier at the time of Ruth. That is the little town Naomi was from, everyone knowing everyone else, and a place to which Ruth had never been. The Bible says: ¹⁹ ...When they came to Bethlehem, the whole town was excited about them. "Is this Naomi?" the women asked. Remember, she left with her husband and two sons, and had been gone about 10 years.
- 8. <u>Naomi expressed her true feelings</u>: ²⁰ "Don't call me Naomi [Pleasant]," she answered them. "Call me Mara [Bitter], because the Almighty has made life bitter for me. ²¹ I went away full, but the LORD brought me back empty. ...the Almighty has hurt me?" Such feelings are natural; have you ever thought the same (Rom. 8:28)?

- 9. <u>God was in control</u>: ²² ...**They came to Bethlehem <u>when</u> people were starting to harvest the barley.** Coming up now, in chapter 2, we will see the barley-related blessing!
- 10. <u>Poor and hungry</u>: Naomi and Ruth, both widows, were in need. ¹ Naomi's husband had a relative, a wealthy man of Elimelech's family; his name was Boaz. Today, people might expect help from their wealthy relative; however, back then, people tried to do what they could to get by and should do the same today, for all who are able.
- 11. <u>Ruth went to work</u>: ³ ...she went... and gleaned in the field after the reapers. She <u>happened</u> to be in the field that belonged to Boaz, who was of Elimelech's family. What do you think? Coincidence or God's Plan
- <u>Boaz sees Ruth</u>: The Bible says: ⁴ <u>Just then</u> Boaz came from Bethlehem. Possibly from the *town proper*, to where they were gleaning in the fields outside of town. What do you think? Coincidence or God's Plan
- 13. <u>Boaz asked his servant regarding Ruth</u>: ⁵ "Whose girl is this?" Boaz may have been immediately attracted to her. Then and now – God is in control and His plan is unfolding!
- 14. <u>The servant explained</u>: ⁷ "She said, 'Please let me glean and gather among the bundles after the reapers.' She came and has been on her feet ever since daybreak..." So Ruth was polite saying please, and a very hard worker!
- 15. <u>Boaz liked Ruth</u>: ⁸ ...Don't go to glean in any other field or leave this one. Stay here with my women. ⁹ ...I will order the servants not to touch you. And when you're thirsty, go to the jars and drink..."
- 16. <u>Ruth's humble response</u>: ¹⁰ ... "Why are you so kind to me as to be interested in me? ... I'm only a foreign woman." We should say similar things to God: Why do you love me, why did You send Your Son? I'm just a poor miserable sinner.
- 17. <u>Boaz responded to Ruth</u>: ¹¹ "I was told about everything you did for your mother-in-law after your husband died, ...how

you left your father, your mother, and the country where you were born and came to a people you didn't know before." Ruth lived her faith!

- 18. <u>Ruth was grateful</u>: ¹³ "You're kind to me... you... encourage your maidservant..." Let us *be thankful* for God's kindness!
- 19. <u>God continued to bless Ruth</u>: ¹⁴ ...Boaz told her, "Come here and have some food..." As Ruth was not deserving, neither are we; God blesses us every day – because He loves us!
- 20. <u>Boaz went even further</u>: ¹⁵ ...**Boaz ordered his servants, "Let her glean even among the bundles, and don't embarrass her."** As Boaz delighted in Ruth, *so the LORD delights in us and sent His Son to save us!*
- 21. <u>Naomi was surprised</u>: ¹⁹ "Where did you glean today?" Ruth answered: "The name of the man I worked with today is Boaz." Naomi responded: ²⁰ ... "May the LORD... bless him! The man is our relative... He's <u>next to</u> our nearest relative [literally, next to our kinsman redeemer]."
- 22. <u>What is a kinsman redeemer</u>? He "was responsible for protecting the interests of needy members of the extended family" (CSSB, 366). Naomi had been filled with despair, but now she had hope for redemption. As we despair over our sins, let us rejoice in God's redemption through Jesus!
- 23. <u>Naomi said to Ruth</u>: ²² "It is best, my daughter... that you go out with his women. Then you'll not be in a strange field where you may be mistreated." As Naomi showed love for Ruth, so let us show love for others!
- 24. <u>Ruth took the advice</u>: ²³ She stayed with the women of Boaz and gleaned till all the barley and the wheat had been harvested. Let us be wise and take the good advice of others!
