Luke 10:1-20 ESV

The Great Adventure!!

Sunday, July 7 at 9:00 + Monday, July 8 at 7 PM Fourth Sunday after Pentecost / Third Sunday after Trinity – 2019

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: In today's Gospel reading, Jesus sent His follows on a great adventure! As we hear about some of the +details and +reactions, let us apply them to



our current adventure through this life on earth!

1. Sent to Prepare the Way: ¹ After this [after Jesus started His journey to Jerusalem] the Lord appointed seventy-two others [thus not the 12] and sent them on ahead of him, two by two, into every town [fortified/walled town/city] and place [in the countryside] where he himself was about to go. ² And he said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. // Jesus, with His Son-of-God eyes, could see the people who were spiritually ripe and ready to be picked; however, more workers were needed. Therefore, even as the 72 were sent out, He asked them to beg God to send even more!

2. Sending Instructions:

a. ³ Go [Depart] your way; behold, I am sending you out as lambs in the midst of wolves. ⁴ Carry no moneybag, no knapsack, no sandals, and greet no one on the road. // Jesus could have said: Your mission is dangerous, it's among wolves – but do not be afraid; I don't take money or food or sleeping provisions – because God

will provide; and I don't waste time by talking to others as you travel – but remain focused on your mission!

- b. ⁵ Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace be to this house!' ⁶ And if a son of peace is there [if the head of that household has or desires peace with God], your peace will rest upon him. But if not, it will return to you [...all are invited into God's kingdom through Jesus, but none are forced to enter]. ⁷ And remain in the same house, eating and drinking what they provide, for the laborer deserves his wages. Do not go from house to house.
 // While the ones sent by Jesus were \$in a city and \$preparing that city for Jesus' upcoming arrival, they were to continue to stay in the same house not looking for a better arrangement, and receive whatever they were given as compensation for their work!
- 3. When They Receive You: ⁸ Whenever you enter a town/city and they receive you, eat what is set before you. ⁹ Heal the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' // Wherever they were received, Jesus told them to *do miraculous healings, and then *proclaim the nearness of God's kingdom. And why in that order? The healings *validated their connection to God and *caused the people to listen carefully!
- 4. When They Reject You: ¹⁰ But whenever you enter a town and they do not receive you, go into its streets and say, ¹¹ 'Even the dust of your town/city that clings to our feet we wipe [dust] off against you. Nevertheless know this, that the kingdom of God has come near.' // Try to imagine two of those men in a city going from house to house to house, and yet at every house the peace they offered was rejected. Whenever that happened Jesus told

them to let the people of that city know that the very kingdom of God – *the forgiveness of their sins* – had come within their grasp and yet they had missed it... *hoping that some would regret, repent, and receive!* Like us missing a golden opportunity, *and thinking it was gone forever*, but then – by God's grace – *having another chance to receive!*

- 5. Sad News for All Who Reject: As Jesus spoke of degrees of reward for faithfulness (Mark 10:28-30), so Jesus will now tell us about degrees of punishment for unbelievers! Realize that these words are still part of the instructions Jesus gave to the ones He was about to send out; He wanted them to fully understand I the importance of their mission and I the horrible eternity for those who reject!
 - a. ¹² I tell you, it will be more bearable on that day [judgment day] for Sodom than for that town/city. // Lenski put things into perspective: "To lie in sin and thus to perish is bad [like Sodom]; to lie in sin and in addition to reject grace [like those who reject Jesus and His servants] and thus to perish is worse" (574).
 - b. ¹³ "Woe to you, Chorazin [an ancient village near Capernaum]! Woe to you, Bethsaida [also an ancient village near Capernaum and the home of some of the apostles]! For if the mighty works done in you had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago, sitting in sackcloth and ashes. ¹⁴ But it will be more bearable in the judgment for Tyre and Sidon than for you. // Note: Jesus did not speak about preaching, but only about miracles; miracles don't save souls, but they should cause people to think about their sin in the light of God's awesome power! The problem: Those places witnessed Jesus' miracles, but were not sorry!

- c. ¹⁵ And you, Capernaum, will you be exalted to heaven? [The answer imbedded in the Greek text is "No"] You shall be brought down to Hades. // Think about it this way: "The greater the grace [God's love] spurned, the more terrible the damnation incurred" (Lenski, 578).
- d. In summary: ¹⁶ "The one who hears you hears me, and the one who rejects you rejects me, and the one who rejects me rejects him who sent me." // Notice the unbreakable chain: God—Jesus—His servants; those who reject God's servants reject Jesus and the Father!

After having been instructed by Jesus, the 72 departed; now, as we continue with verse 17, they have returned to Jesus!

6. Explaining the Proper Perspective: ¹⁷ The seventy-two returned with joy, saying, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us in your name!" ¹⁸ And he said to them, "I saw Satan fall like lightning from heaven. ¹⁹ Behold, I have given you authority to tread on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy, and nothing shall hurt you. ²⁰ Nevertheless, do not rejoice in this, that the spirits are subject to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven." // Upon returning they all had joy because the demons obeyed them; they experienced Jesus' power over the devil! But what is really important? Not what we do, but what God has done for us: Choosing us to be His own and forgiving us of all sins!

This Week's Challenge: Know that EVERYONE needs Jesus; rejoice that YOU have Jesus!!

Let Us Pray: Dear Father, as we venture through this life on earth, keep us close to You and grateful for Your eternal gifts!

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
