

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: We have many problems in the world, <u>but this is the worst</u>: The vast majority believe that ⇒right-doers will be welcomed into heaven, while ⇒wrongdoers will be sent away. I realize that makes perfect sense, but, according to God's word, that is not true.

At the beginning of Luke 15, we discover who was in the audience of Jesus' hearers; *Jesus was speaking to THEM*!

- Audience: ¹ Now all <u>the tax collectors and the sinners</u> were coming near [Jesus] to listen to Him.² Both <u>the</u> <u>Pharisees and the scribes</u> began to grumble, saying, "This man receives sinners and eats with them." ³ So He told <u>them</u> [all of them] this parable... // Let's try to understand the two groups of people:
 - a. <u>Tax collectors and sinners People who knew they had</u> <u>done wrong</u>: They were wrongdoers; they believed their sins had <u>disqualified</u> them from heaven.
 - <u>Pharisees and scribes People who thought they were</u> <u>good</u>: They were *right-doers*; they believed *their following of the rules* made them <u>qualified</u> for heaven.

- The Younger Son Represents the Wrongdoers: ¹¹ "A man had two sons. ¹² "The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the estate that falls to me.' So he divided his wealth between them." // The son to his father: You are dead to me, so give me my share now!
 - a. <u>His openly sinful life</u>: ¹³ "And not many days later, the younger son gathered everything together and went on a journey into a distant country, and there he squandered his estate with loose living." // He rejected his father and chose his own way (Is. 53:6)[©].
 - b. <u>His consequences</u>: ¹⁴ "Now when he had spent <u>everything</u> [all his share of the estate], a severe famine occurred in that country, and he began to be <u>impoverished</u> [yes, the way of sin has consequences]. ¹⁵ So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, and he sent him into his fields to feed <u>swine</u> [unclean for Jews (Lev. 11:7), so a miserable job]. ¹⁶ And he would have gladly filled his stomach with the pods that the swine were eating, and no one was giving anything to him [his so-called friends were gone]."
 - c. <u>His change of heart</u>: ¹⁷ "But when he came to his <u>senses</u> [stepping back and seeing the big picture], he said, 'How many of my father's hired men have more than enough bread, but I am dying here with hunger! ¹⁸ 'I will get up and go to my father, and will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven, and in your sight; ¹⁹ I am no longer worthy to be called your son; make me as one of your hired men." // Even though some question the sincerity of his sorrow, *it seems genuine*: ♦My sin is against God and against you! ♦I have forfeited my position as your son! God knows the intent of every heart, *see 1 Chronicles 28:9*!

- d. His father's compassion, forgiveness, and joy: ²⁰ "So he got up and came to his father. But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and felt compassion for him [How do we know? He...], ...ran and embraced him and kissed him. ²¹ And the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and in your sight; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' [It is obvious that the father immediately accepted his son's confession / repentance – because...]²² ...the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly bring out the best robe and put it on him [for celebrating], and put a ring on his hand [showing authority] and sandals on his feet; ²³ and bring the fattened calf, kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; ²⁴ for this son of mine was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found.' And they began to celebrate." // Note that the father NEVER mentioned a single sin of his son; instead, the father did everything possible to fully welcome him back into the family! Jesus did the same for all repentant tax collectors and sinners of His time and wants to do the same for everyone today who repents! Jesus' sacrifice is MORE POWERFUL than every sin!
- 3. The Older Son Represents the Right-Doers: ²⁵ "Now his older son was in the field [doing the work of a good son], and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. ²⁶ And he summoned one of the servants and began inquiring what these things could be. ²⁷ And he said to him, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fattened calf because he has received him back safe and sound.'" // The news was good the younger son repented and came home! All should greatly rejoice, but how did the older son react?

- a. <u>With anger</u>: ²⁸ "But he became angry and was not willing to go in; and his father came out and began pleading with him." // His anger matched the anger of the Pharisees and scribes against the tax collectors and sinners. *He refused to celebrate his repentant brother*.
- b. With entitlement: ²⁹ "But he answered and said to his father, 'Look! For so many years I have been serving you and I have never neglected a command of yours; and yet you have never given me a young goat, so that I might celebrate with my friends; ³⁰ but when this son of yours came, who has devoured your wealth with prostitutes, you killed the fattened calf for him." // The older son thought he deserved good things, but his brother was undeserving. When it comes to heaven, no level of obedience can earn it!
- 4. The Father Represents God: ³¹ "And he said to him, 'Son, you have always been with me, and all that is mine is yours. ³² 'But we had to celebrate and rejoice, for this brother of yours was dead and has begun to live, and was lost and has been found.'" // When we know God the Father through our faith in Jesus, then we have a great inheritance and should desire the same for everyone!
