Fifth Sunday in Lent – 2022 <u>Saturday</u>, 4/2 at 4:00 & <u>Sunday</u>, 4/3 at 9:00



Text: Luke 20:9-20 NAS-95

Lenten Wednesdays: Services 11 & 7; Meals 12 & 6

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: <u>During Jesus' ministry</u>,

➡His followers increased while ➡those who listened to the
Jewish leaders decreased. Therefore, the Jewish leaders grew
in their →jealousy and →hatred toward Jesus.

Now, in today's gospel reading, the setting is **Tuesday of Holy Week**. The leaders have just questioned Jesus' authority to drive the *moneychangers and *merchants out of the temple. Then (as recorded in Matthew) Jesus told the parable of the two sons; then <u>Jesus said to the Jewish leaders</u>: "Truly I say to you that the tax collectors and prostitutes will get into the kingdom of God before you" (Matt. 21:31 NAU), which certainly intensified the situation!

Then, *immediately*, Jesus told **the parable of the wicked tenants** – *today's gospel reading*. A parable is a story with two meanings: (1) *on the surface* and (2) *below the surface*:

- a. The owner and planter is God the Father.
- b. The vineyard is the kingdom of God.
- c. The vine-growers are the Jewish leaders.
- d. The produce includes sorrow, trust, and obedience.

- e. The slaves are the prophets sent by God.
- f. The beloved son is Jesus sent by His Father.
- g. The others are the Gentiles.
- 1. Setting: 9 And [Jesus] began to tell the people this parable: "A man [God] planted a vineyard [His kingdom] and rented it out to vine-growers [Jews, especially the leaders], and went on a journey for a long time." // Think back to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, and the descendants of Jacob who became the nation of Israel. God made them His people and showered His blessings upon them!
- 2. Rejection of God's Slaves: 10 "At the harvest time he sent a slave [prophet] to the vine-growers, so that they would give him some of the produce of the vineyard [sorrow, trust, and obedience]; but the vine-growers beat him and sent him away empty-handed. 11 And he proceeded to send another slave [prophet]; and they beat him also and treated him shamefully and sent him away emptyhanded. 12 And he proceeded to send a third [prophet]; and this one also they wounded and cast out." // As the Jewish leaders heard those words, they probably recalled the horrible treatment various prophets had received. The Bible says, \(\psi''\)Jezebel destroyed the prophets of the LORD" (1 Ki. 18:4), ▶ "the sons of Israel have... killed Your prophets with the sword" (1 Ki. 19:10), and ▶"[the Israelites] killed Your prophets who had admonished them" (Neh. 9:26 NAU). God sent the prophets in love, yet they murdered them!
- 3. Rejection of God's Son: ¹³ "The owner of the vineyard said, 'What shall I do? I will send my beloved son [Jesus]; perhaps they will respect him.' ¹⁴ But when the vinegrowers saw him, they reasoned [discussed, debated] with

one another, saying, 'This is the heir; let us kill him so that the inheritance will be ours.' 15 So they threw him out of the vineyard and killed him." // Think of the escalating rejection of the Israelites: For the most part, they refused to repent—so no sorrow, no faith, no obedience; then they rejected the prophets; and then they killed the prophets. Note: As Jesus was speaking, He was very aware of their plans to kill Him!

- 4. Response of God the Father: "What, then, will the owner of the vineyard do to them? 16 "He will come and destroy these vine-growers and will give the vineyard to others [Gentiles]." When they heard it, they said, "May it never be!" // Jesus' hearers were ◆Jewish leaders and ◆other Jews who were in Jerusalem for the Passover. It seems those other Jews "hoped to God that [the story] would not come to such a terrible end as the killing of the heir and the judgment on the vine-growers" (Lenski, 982). However, as Jesus knew of their desire to kill Him, so He also knew of the coming destruction of Jerusalem in AD 70!
- 5. Trust or Consequences: ¹⁷ But Jesus looked at them [the Jewish leaders] and said, "What then is this that is written [in Psalm 118:22]: 'THE STONE WHICH THE BUILDERS REJECTED, THIS BECAME THE CHIEF CORNER stone'? ¹⁸ "Everyone who falls on that stone will be broken to pieces; but on whomever it falls, it will scatter him like dust." // The Jewish leaders had already rejected Jesus and, in three days, would kill Jesus.
 - a. <u>Chief Corner Stone</u>: The Jewish leaders basically threw Jesus away – as unusable, yet he is the MOST IMPORTANT STONE in the entire kingdom of God!

- Since Jesus is the Chief Corner Stone, every repentant person is aligned with Jesus!
- b. Rejectors of THE STONE: For those rejecting now, it may seem insignificant. But imagine ▶running full speed into a HUGE rock OR ▶having a huge rock fall on top of you. For all who keep rejecting Jesus, and for those who know Him now yet go the way of the world, they will be terribly ⊗broken and ⊗pulverized forever!
- 6. Hatred and Plans to Murder: ¹⁹ The scribes and the chief priests [were so enraged that they] tried to lay hands on Him that very hour, and [yet they did not because] they feared the people; for they understood that He spoke this parable against them [and maybe the other people understood that too]. ²⁰ So they watched Him, and sent spies [on that same day] who pretended to be righteous, in order that they might catch Him in some statement, so that they could deliver Him to the rule and the authority of the governor [Pilate]. // No repentance, only murder ...

Take Aways<mark>:</mark>

- <u>Truth</u> Alignment with Jesus is CRITICAL!
- Relevance Everyone is either aligned or will be crushed!
- <u>Inspiration</u> NOW is the golden opportunity to repent!

Let Us Pray: Dear Jesus, even as people hated You and wanted to kill You, You kept teaching them, loving them, and calling them to repent. *Grant many to heed Your call today!*

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
