

Introduction: Dear Friends in Christ: Last week we began a series on our eight worship area banners. Each banner connects to one of the eight "I AM" statements made by Jesus in the Gospel of John.


<u>Remember</u> – *from last week*: It was the Son of God who spoke to Moses from the burning bush and said, "I AM WHO I AM" (Ex. 3:14). <u>Let us understand</u>: He is Yahweh, *the Great I AM*, and now *our Lord Jesus Christ in human flesh!*

Last week we focused on Jesus saying: "I AM the Bread of Life" (John 6) and "I AM the Light of the World" (John 8). In the context of John 6, we eat the Bread of Life – NOT as we do in the Lord's Supper, BUT by *trusting in Jesus, *learning from Him, and *following Him. In relation to Jesus being the Light of the World – He is like the sun! As people who eat the Bread of Life, we are called to function like the moon by reflecting Jesus in whatever we *say and *do!

The "I AM" Banners: We have eight banners, today we focus on number three and four:

3. I AM the Door (John 10:7-10).

a. In John chapter 9, on a Sabbath day, Jesus healed a man who had been born blind. After the healing, some Pharisees – who SHOULD have been praising God – argued with the man about what had happened.



b. Then, in John chapter 10, Jesus said these words to those same

Pharisees: ⁷ "Truly, truly, I say to you, <u>I am the door</u> of the sheep. ⁸ All who came before Me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep did not hear them."


- i. Who are the thieves and robbers who came before Jesus? The greedy religious leaders, including those Pharisees, who served for their own benefit!
- ii. Who are the sheep? They are the true believers, the faithful remnant! How do they function? They know the Bible is true, so they compare everything with the Bible to know whether it is true or false (see James 1:23-25).
- c. ⁹ "<u>I am the door</u>; if anyone enters through Me, he will be saved, and will go in and out and find pasture." //
 True shepherds serve under Jesus, the Good Shepherd.
 They never tell people what to **do** or **give** to be saved; instead, they keep pointing people to Jesus who is THE Door the only way to enter God's kingdom and receive God's gift of eternal life (see Acts 4:12)!

- d. ¹⁰ "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I came that [the sheep] may have life and have it abundantly." // Note the SHARP contrast: steal, kill, destroy versus life abundantly! Let us:
 - i. Gladly trust in Jesus for eternal life!
 - ii. Be grateful to know Him now!
 - iii. Keep looking forward to being with Him and all believers forevermore! Regarding Jesus' return, the Bible says: "...we who are alive and remain will be caught up together with [all who died in Jesus] in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air, and so we shall always be with the Lord" (1Th. 4:17).

4. I AM the Good Shepherd (John 10:11-15).

a. The words on banner number 4 are also located in John chapter 10. Notice the HUGE contrast between the Good Shepherd and a hired hand. Jesus said:

11 "I am the good shepherd; the good shepherd lays down His life for the sheep. 12 He who is a hired hand, and not a shepherd, who is not the owner of the sheep, sees the wolf coming, and



- of the sheep, sees the wolf coming, and leaves the sheep and flees, and the wolf snatches them and scatters *them*. ¹³ *He flees* because he is a hired hand and is not concerned about the sheep."
 - i. Think about a hired hand: he has no ownership of the sheep, nor love for the sheep; for him, it is just a job! Since he cares more about himself than the sheep, he flees in the face of trouble or harm.
 - ii. <u>But think about Jesus being our shepherd and us</u> being His sheep: **Satan** comes after us to eternally

steal, kill, and destroy: "Your adversary, the devil, prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour" (1 Peter 5:8). BUT our Good Shepherd is *so good and *so great and loves us *so much that He gave His own life — in a most painful and horrible way — to save us from a terrible eternity. Jesus said, "Greater love has no one than this, that one lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). And we are those friends!

- b. Again, Jesus said, ¹⁴ "<u>I am the good shepherd</u>, and I <u>know</u> My own and My own <u>know</u> Me, ¹⁵ even as the Father knows Me and I know the Father; and I lay down My life for the sheep."
 - i. Jesus knows of our sins, BUT, amazingly, He lived, died, and was raised for our salvation! The Bible says, "For Christ also died for sins once for all, the just for the unjust, so that He might bring us to God" (1 Pet. 3:18).
 - ii. When the Good Shepherd **knows us** and we **know Him**, we are in a relationship with each other: ▶He is our Savior and Lord and ▶we are the ones under His love and care ⊕enjoying the benefits of His saving work and ⊕looking forward to a peaceful, joyful, exciting, stress-free eternity!

Let Us Pray: Dear Lord Jesus, each week, as we see our banners, let us rejoice that You are THE Door of the Sheep – through which we have entered God's kingdom, and let us also rejoice in Your shepherd care for us – saving, providing, protecting – until we are finally in Your glorious presence!

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
