

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: There are two major categories of people in the world:

- Many are in dead in their sins and separated from God, but they are unaware of their dreadful condition.
- Others are alive in Christ, but they keep thinking about their sins and keep wondering if they are forgiven.

In this sermon, based on John chapter 4, Jesus wants us to understand that His love  $\heartsuit$  is greater than our sin!

1. The Setting: [Jesus had been in Jerusalem talking to Nicodemus; now, as He headed for Galilee] <sup>5</sup> ...He came to a city of Samaria called Sychar, near the parcel of ground that Jacob gave to his son Joseph; <sup>6</sup> and Jacob's well was there. So, Jesus, being wearied from His journey, was sitting thus by the well. It was about the sixth hour [probably around noon]. // The shortest path from Judea to Galilee was through Samaria, but most Jews took the long way to avoid Samaria. Why? Samaritans arose from Assyrian Gentiles intermarrying with Jews about 700 years earlier. But Jesus, on purpose, traveled through Samaria.

2. Jesus Loved the Samaritan Woman: <sup>7</sup> There came a woman of Samaria to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give Me a drink." <sup>8</sup> For His disciples had gone away into the city to buy food. <sup>9</sup> Therefore the Samaritan woman said to Him, "How is it that You, being a Jew, ask me for a drink since I am a Samaritan woman?" (For Jews have no dealings with Samaritans.) // The woman was by herself; she was probably despised by the other women because she was living in sin. But Jesus did not avoid her or judge her; instead, \*He cared about her, \*He talked to her. Jesus wants us to do the same!

## 3. The Living Water:

- a. <u>Jesus made her curious</u>: <sup>10</sup> Jesus answered and said to her, "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is who says to you, 'Give Me a drink,' you would have asked Him, and He would have given you living water." // Jesus was thirsty, and the woman had come to draw water, so Jesus continued the water-theme. The Messiah, though not yet known to the woman, moved the conversation from drinking water to living water!
- b. She gave a practical response: <sup>11</sup> She said to Him, "Sir, You have nothing to draw with and the well is deep; where then do You get that living water? <sup>12</sup> You are not greater than our father Jacob, are You, who gave us the well, and drank of it himself and his sons and his cattle?" // Like Nicodemus from last week, the woman kept thinking physically, not spiritually. So, Jesus kept pointing her beyond the physical.
- c. <u>Jesus explained His great offer</u>: <sup>13</sup> Jesus answered and said to her, "Everyone who drinks of this water [from Jacob's well] will thirst again; <sup>14</sup> but whoever drinks of

- the water that I will give him shall never thirst; but the water that I will give him will become in him a well of water springing up to eternal life." // Jesus made His offer so attractive — "never thirst; ...well of water... eternal life." All such things were far different than her daily grind to draw water from Jacob's well.
- d. The woman was still thinking about regular water: 15 The woman said to Him, "Sir, give me this water, so I will not be thirsty nor come all the way here to draw." // She wanted what Jesus was offering, but, still, she didn't understand the GREATNESS of His offer.
- 4. Jesus' Knew All About the Woman: [So He turned the conversation to her personal life:] <sup>16</sup> He said to her, "Go, call your husband and come here." <sup>17</sup> The woman answered and said, "I have no husband." Jesus said to her, "You have correctly said, 'I have no husband'; <sup>18</sup> for you have had five husbands, and the one whom you now have is not your husband; this you have said truly." // Since Jesus loved ♥ her, He stated her exact situation to \*get her attention, \*help her to see her great need, and \*bring her to repentance (godly sorrow and saving faith).
- 5. The Woman Wondered about the Two Worship
  Locations: <sup>19</sup> The woman said to [Jesus], "Sir, I perceive
  that You are a prophet [since You know personal things
  about me]. <sup>20</sup> "Our fathers worshiped in this mountain
  [Mt. Gerizim], and you people [you Jews] say that in
  Jerusalem is the place where men ought to worship." //
  Why two locations? As Gentiles were barred from entering
  the Jerusalem temple, so were Samaritans which is one
  reason why they worshiped at Mt. Gerizim.

- 6. Jesus Explained the Bigger Picture: <sup>21</sup> Jesus said to her, "Woman, believe Me, an hour is coming when neither in this mountain nor in Jerusalem will you worship the Father. <sup>22</sup> You worship what you do not know; we worship what we know, for salvation is from the Jews [since the Son of God put on Jewish flesh and blood]. 23 But an hour is coming, and now is [since the Messiah is here], when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth; for such people the Father seeks to be His worshipers. <sup>24</sup> God is spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth." // Forty years from that time, the Jerusalem temple would be destroyed. **The focus** then and today should be worshiping "in spirit and truth." What does that mean? In spirit – means we are engaged: listening, thinking, repenting, believing! In truth – means we believe all of God's word, which is truth (John 17:17).
- 7. The Great Reveal: <sup>25</sup> The woman said to [Jesus], "I know that Messiah is coming (He who is called Christ); when that One comes, He will declare all things to us." [Jesus had just declared some very amazing things to her!] <sup>26</sup> [Then] Jesus said to her, "I who speak to you am He." // In other words, I am the Promised Messiah! Reading further in John 4, the woman went back into town and told others about Jesus, then many Samaritans believed in Jesus!

Let Us Pray: Dear Jesus! As You showed love for the sinful Samaritan woman, so You love everyone — even us! Help us to rejoice in knowing You and being fully forgiven; then, may our joy overflow to others, and may they also trust in You!

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
