

Introduction: Dear friends: Many in the United States have resources, such as *decent health, *employment or pension,
*money in a bank (94%), *family and friends, *etc.!

- **<u>Unbelievers</u>** rely on *themselves and their resources*.
- **<u>Believers</u>** are called to rely on *the Holy Trinity*.

Backstory: Later in David's 40-year reign over Israel, he ordered that the fighting men in all Israel be counted. When we count our resources, *we show our reliance upon them*.

The LORD disciplined David by sending a plague on Israel, which resulted in the death of 70,000 men (2 Sam. 24; 1 Chr. 21). To express his repentance, David *bought land, *built an altar, and *offered a sacrifice to the LORD.

In This Sermon: We focus on Psalm 30, which "was likely written to dedicate this land, the place where God's temple would later be built" (TLSB).

- Praise the LORD for His Healing: David had been severely ill, near death, but the LORD helped him and healed him. So, David wrote: ¹ I will exalt [praise] You, LORD, for You have lifted me up, And have not let my enemies rejoice over me. ² LORD my God, I cried to You for help, and You healed me. ³ LORD, You have brought up my soul from Sheol [the grave – since I had almost died]; You have kept me alive, that I would not go down to the pit.
 - a. When We Become III, We may be Tempted to Rely on Ourselves and Our Resources: ✓I will take some over-the-counter medicine, ✓I will drink more fluids, and ✓I will get more sleep. If I'm still not feeling well, ✓I will go to my doctor or ✓I will seek emergency help.
 - b. <u>David Relied on the LORD</u>: David, an OT believer,
 prayed, *the LORD heard, *the LORD showed him mercy, and *the LORD restored his health. Then David gave the proper response of hearty praise!
- Praise the LORD for His Goodness: ⁴ Sing praise to the LORD, you His godly ones [who are trusting in the Messiah], And praise the mention [the remembrance] of His holiness.
 ⁵ For His anger is but for a moment, His favor is for a lifetime; Weeping may last for the night, But a shout of joy comes in the morning.
 - a. <u>The LORD Has Transformed Us</u>: We have sinned, so He has sent His Son to ♦wash us clean and ♦make us holy in His sight! *Therefore, let us praise Him*!
 - b. <u>The LORD Disciplines Us</u>: When <u>believers</u> begin to sin without repentance, the LORD causes us to struggle because +He loves us and +wants us to repent. When we do, He restores us, and we praise Him!

- 3. The Proud Will Fall: ⁶ Now as for me, I said in my prosperity, "I will never be moved." ⁷ LORD, by Your favor You have made my mountain to stand strong; You hid Your face, I was dismayed.
 - a. <u>I Can Do It</u>: David looked at his ✓ greatest and ✓ vast resources, then he said, "I will never be moved." He forgot about the <u>source</u> of his greatness *it was <u>not</u> himself, but the LORD*. Paul warned the Corinthians: "…let the one who <u>thinks he stands</u> watch out that he does not fall" (1 Corinthians 10:12).
 - b. <u>The LORD Shut Off His Blessings</u>: That was for David's own good, to show him his sin. Many others need the same treatment today <u>before</u> it is too late to repent!
- 4. It Is Good to Confess Our Sins: ⁸ To You, LORD, I called, And to the Lord I pleaded for compassion [mercy]: ⁹ "What gain is there in my blood, if I go down to the pit [to my death]? Will the dust praise You? Will it declare Your faithfulness? ¹⁰ "Hear, LORD, and be gracious to me; LORD, be my helper."
 - a. <u>Confession Must Be True</u>: David wrote in Psalm 145: "The LORD is near to all who call upon Him, <u>To all</u> <u>who call upon Him in truth</u>" (18). David was not deserving of the LORD's forgiveness, nor are we. David pleaded for mercy – asking the LORD to *hold His punishment and *gift him with forgiveness.
 - b. <u>Trust Has Returned</u>: David had fallen into relying on himself, but, by the Holy Spirit, he *repented and *returned to his reliance on the LORD, calling Him "my helper." If we need to do the same, let us quickly <u>repent</u> and <u>return</u> (Acts 3:19)!

- 5. Hearty Thanks: ¹¹ You have turned my mourning into dancing for me; You have untied my sackcloth and encircled me with joy, ¹² That *my* soul may sing praise to You and not be silent. LORD my God, I will give thanks to You forever.
 - a. <u>From Very Low</u>: David *had turned to himself,
 *brought great trouble on his nation, *had become severely ill, and *was headed for death.
 - b. <u>To Very High</u>: By the grace of God, David ♦saw his sin,
 ♦pleaded with the LORD, and ♦received mercy.
 - i. David's mourning had become dancing!
 - ii. David's sackcloth had become silk!
 - iii. David's heart was full of joy!
 - iv. David's lips were full of praise to the LORD!

Prayer: Consider this passage: NV Proverbs 30:8-9 "Keep falsehood and lies far from me; give me neither poverty nor riches, but give me only my daily bread. Otherwise, I may have too much and disown you and say, 'Who is the LORD?' Or I may become poor and steal, and so dishonor the name of my God."

Dear LORD, blessings are wonderful, **but** they can entice us to trust in them rather than in You. <u>Therefore</u>, help us to **\equiverbcare**, from Your word and **\equiverbcare** always rely on You – *Father, Son, and Holy Spirit!* And all God's people said: Amen!

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
