Introduction: Dear friends: What is the point of the story of The Good Samaritan? See the options above...

 A Lawyer Wanted to Trap Jesus: ²⁵ ...a lawyer stood up and <u>put [Jesus] to the test</u> [Why? To trap Him or catch Him in a mistake!], saying, "<u>Teacher, what shall I do to inherit</u> <u>eternal life</u>?" // The lawyer believed that *some action* on *his part* was *required*!

²⁶ And [Jesus] said to him, "What is written in the Law? How does it read to you?" ²⁷ And he answered, "YOU SHALL LOVE THE LORD YOUR GOD WITH ALL YOUR HEART, AND WITH ALL YOUR SOUL, AND WITH ALL YOUR STRENGTH, AND WITH ALL YOUR MIND [DEUT. 6:5]; AND YOUR NEIGHBOR AS YOURSELF [LEV. 19:18]." ²⁸ And [Jesus] said to him, "You have answered correctly; do this and you will live."

- a. <u>Do This and You Will Live</u>: What does that mean?
 "do" is a *present imperative verb*. It means "'keep doing' without a single break" (Lenski, 601).
- b. <u>How Does that Apply to Eternal Life</u>? We must <u>keep</u> <u>loving God</u> with *all we are* and *all we have* <u>and keep</u> <u>loving our neighbor</u> *as we love ourselves*!
- c. <u>What Are Three HUGE Problems</u>?
 - James 2:10 "...whoever keeps the <u>whole law</u> and yet stumbles in <u>one point</u>, he has become guilty of all."
 - ii. Galatians 3:10 "...Cursed is <u>everyone</u> who does not abide by <u>all things</u> written in the book of the law, to perform them."
 - iii. Romans 3:12 "...There is <u>none</u> who does good, There is <u>not even one</u>."
- Jesus Wanted to Save the Lawyer: The lawyer, ²⁹ "wanting to justify himself, he said to Jesus, '<u>And who is my</u> <u>neighbor</u>?'" // Lenski helps us understand how Jews at that time looked at others: "In general, no Gentile and certainly no Samaritan would be termed 'a neighbor'" (603). <u>Therefore</u>, the lawyer asked: "...who is my neighbor?"

³⁰ Jesus replied and said, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho [a potentially dangerous trip of about 17 miles], and he encountered robbers, and they stripped him and beat him, and went away leaving him half dead.

³¹ And by coincidence a <u>priest</u> [of the tribe of Levi, a descendant of Aaron, who served in the temple] was going down on that road, and when he saw him, he passed by on the other

side. // He stayed as far away as possible – for good reasons: If he stopped and helped, maybe he would be <u>robbed</u>, <u>stripped</u>, and <u>beaten</u>. Nobody saw what he did – **EXCEPT GOD!**

³² Likewise a Levite [also of the tribe of Levi, but <u>not</u> descended from Aaron, who assisted the priests] also, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. // The Levite acted like the priest – AND GOD SAW HIM!

³³ But a <u>Samaritan</u> [a person generally despised by the Jews – due to ethnic and religious impurity, a different place of worship, and historical conflicts] who was on a journey came upon <u>him</u> [the man who had been <u>robbed</u>, <u>stripped</u>, and <u>beaten</u>]; and when he saw him,

- he <u>felt compassion</u>, ³⁴ and <u>came to him</u>
- and <u>bandaged up his wounds</u>, pouring oil and wine on them;
- and he put him on his own animal [possibly forcing him to walk],
- and brought him to an inn
- and took care of him.
- ³⁵ On the next day <u>he took out two denarii</u> [equivalent to two days wages] and gave them to the innkeeper and said, '<u>Take care of him</u>;
- and <u>whatever more you spend</u>, when I return, <u>I will</u> <u>repay you</u>.'

[Then Jesus asked the lawyer:] ³⁶ Which of these three do you think proved to be a neighbor to the man who fell into the robbers' hands?" ³⁷ And [the lawyer] said, "The one who showed compassion to him." Then Jesus said to him, "Go and do the same."

- a. <u>Go and Do the Same</u>: <u>Why did Jesus give the lawyer</u> <u>that command</u>? To help **him** and **everyone** understand that it is **IMPOSSIBLE** for **ANYONE** to <u>• fully</u> and <u>always</u> love God and <u>• always</u> love his neighbor as himself!
- b. <u>What Should We Take Away From the Parable</u>?
 - i. ONLY Jesus fully and always loved God with His entire being!
 - ii. ONLY Jesus fully and always loved others as He loved Himself!
- c. What Should Be Important for You and Me?
 - i. **NEVER** trust in anything we do for heaven!
 - ii. ALWAYS trust in Jesus alone for heaven!
 - iii. DO OUR BEST to love God and our neighbor! <u>Why</u>?
 - 1. To glorify God!
 - 2. To point others to Jesus, who is the ONE WAY TO HEAVEN!
