## Matthew 18:1-14 ESV Young Children What did Jesus say about them? How should we respond to them? Sunday, Sept. 7 at 8:00 & 10:45 + Monday, Sept. 8 at 7 PM 13<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Pentecost / 12<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Trinity – 2014

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: Think about an infant or a very young child in comparison to us. They are \*small,
\*weak, and \*lacking knowledge; we are \*bigger, \*stronger, and \*know so much more! So who is greater in this world?
We are! But who is greater in God's kingdom? Not the proud, but those who are humble – like little children! Now, may God help us to rightly understand and apply His Word.

## 1. Young Children – They are Examples for Adults (1-5):

- a. <sup>1</sup> At that time the disciples came to Jesus, saying, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" // Since they were becoming proud, they probably wanted to know which one of them Jesus would identify as the greatest, but to give the appearance of being humble they asked the question in a general way.
- <sup>2</sup> And calling to him a child,<sup>1</sup> he put him in the midst of them <sup>3</sup> and said, "Truly, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. // So Jesus' disciples thought they were either the

greatest **or** moving in that direction, but Jesus basically said: If you don't stop going in your present direction, you will have no part in the kingdom of heaven! As Jesus was calling them to repent – to turn, how is Jesus calling us to repent – to change in our own lives? Let us pray...

- c. <sup>4</sup> Whoever humbles himself like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven." // Dr. Kretzmann wrote: "There must be no considering of honor and glory before men, no false ambition, no scheming for power..." (97)
   <u>Our part</u> is to humble ourselves; <u>God's part</u> is to exalt us *when* and *how He chooses*.
- d. <sup>5</sup> "Whoever receives one such child in my name receives me..." // With those words Jesus identified Himself with young children: As they humbly trust in the Lord, so Jesus humbly trusted in His heavenly Father. Let us do the same!
- Adults They Must Not Lead Young Children Into Sin (6-9): So what are some ways we could lead young children into sin? (1) By teaching them what is false, for example, that: •evolution is true, •the Bible is not God's Word, or •doing good is the way to heaven! So it is important for us to know the Bible! (2) By living in sin! Why? Children learn more by what we do than by what we say! So it is important to live in repentance! Now we consider some shocking examples:
  - a. <u>It would be better to drown</u>: <sup>6</sup> "...but whoever causes one of these little ones *who believe in me* to sin, it would be <u>better</u> for him to have a

great millstone fastened around his neck and to be drowned in the depth of the sea." // So there are two possible actions: (1) I could lead a *little* one into sin **OR** (2) someone could attach a stone weighing hundreds of pounds to my neck, then through me into Lake Erie. Even though I may be led to choose option (1), the outcome may be eternal punishment, so option (2) is <u>better</u>!

<sup>7</sup> "Woe to the world for temptations to sin! For it is necessary that temptations come, but woe to the one by whom the temptation comes! // "Woe" is an expression of grief, so not something we want! But grief will come to the

person through whom the temptation comes!

b. <u>It would be better to lose a body part</u>: <sup>8</sup> And if your hand or your foot causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away. [Why?] It is <u>better</u> for you to enter life crippled or lame than with two hands or two feet to be thrown into the eternal fire. <sup>9</sup> And if your eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away. [Why?] It is <u>better</u> for you to enter life with one eye than with two eyes to be thrown into the hell of fire." // Can you imagine being without a hand, foot, or eye? That would be better than sinning without repentance and being thrown into hell!

## 3. Adults – They Should Know How Much God Loves Young Children (10-14):

a. <u>They have guardian angels</u>: <sup>10</sup> "See that you do not despise [look down on] one of these little ones [who believe in me]. For I tell you that in heaven their angels always see the face of my Father who is in heaven."<sup>2</sup> // So the "little ones" look insignificant to us, but they are very important to God!

b. Every single one is valuable: <sup>12</sup> "What do you think? If a man has a hundred sheep, and one of them has gone astray, does he not leave the ninety-nine on the mountains and go in search of the one that went astray? <sup>13</sup> And if he finds it, truly, I say to you, he rejoices over it more than over the ninety-nine that never went astray. <sup>14</sup> So it is not the will of my Father who is in heaven that one of these little ones [who believe in me] should perish." // So can we rightly reason that a particular little one is not important to his Heavenly Father? By no means! Some little ones may feel forgotten, but let us teach them that God + made them, +loves them, +saved them, and +provides for them!

**Conclusion:** So, by God's grace, let us •be humble, •be sorry for our sins, •trust in Jesus as our Savior, and •bless little children by *teaching them the truth* and *living according to it!* And all God's people said: **Amen!**
